

Principal's Report

Last Friday, the passage of land between Briggs Oval and UT Creek was a hive of activity with students and members of the community planting trees and shrubs native to the area. This has been an extensive rejuvenation project, lead impressively by Penny Steuart, over the last sixth months where we have had numerous school and community groups collaborating. This is a great news story that we have featured in "Inside Out" today.

It is that exciting time of year when students start to plan what subjects they will study next year, with our help and with the help of their families.

Our "Open Night" is on this Wednesday the 31st of July. It is an essential night for families to gain knowledge around senior course selections.



Planet Ark Schools Tree Planting Day - UT Creek Repatriation Zone Project

Last Friday, our College Community in collaboration with the Shire of Murrindindi achieved something wonderful. We planted over 650 native seedlings as part of Planet Ark's National Schools Tree Planting Day. The event saw the enthusiastic participation of over 200 students, 16 College staff members and 20 community members. Spirits were high as we removed the non-native grass, dug holes and planted seedlings, transforming the degraded riparian zone along UT Creek at the back of Briggs Oval.

The project began in November 2023 when our College joined the Resource Smart Schools Program, an initiative by Sustainability Victoria. Ms. Steuart recognised the need to increase biodiversity at our College and sought assistance from the Upper Goulburn Landcare Network. With ambitious plans and no prior experience, she identified the UT Creek riparian zone adjacent to our school as a focal point for rehabilitation. During Semester One, the Year 9 Mission X class assessed the ecological health of the zone and found it to be at the lowest rank on the Rapid Riparian Health Survey scale. The area had been neglected for over 30 years a dumping ground for hard rubbish and green waste. It was overrun with blackberries, Scotch thistle, prunus and ash trees.



We were awarded a generous \$3000 Planet Ark Seedling Bank Grant, which was paid directly to Euroa Arboretum. They sourced native seeds from our area and grew 850 trees, shrubs and grasses specifically for our Tree Planting Event. We are deeply grateful to Cathy Olive for her expertise in selecting the plant species, coordinating their distribution and instructing us on how to plant them on Friday.

The project gained momentum when Sue McNair, the Environmental Officer from the Shire of Murrindindi offered her expertise and arranged for the blackberries to be sprayed. "That's a huge area to rehabilitate. We'd normally start clearing 12 months in advance and maybe do a quarter of what you've planning," she noted. Undeterred by the challenge, our Mission X class began removing the rubbish and non-native plants, cutting down over 200 non-native trees whilst being stung multiple times by European Wasps. The clearing efforts were continued by Ms. Steuart and Darrell Hedger on weekends, during lunchtimes and after school.

Sue played a crucial role in securing permission from the Goulburn Broken Catchment Management Authority to transform the waterway and from the Taungurung Land and Water Council to rehabilitate the banks under a Land Use Activity Agreement. We acknowledge the Taungurung's deep connection to our local land and water and were thrilled to receive their consent, allowing us to honour their perspectives in this project.



Izzy Weston from the Shire collaborated with our 'Guardians of the Earth' group to promote the event and organise school-wide activities, including the SRC's 'Wear Green Day' and tree-related quiz questions on the Daily Bulletin. The VET Hospitality class prepared a delicious morning tea for the planters, and our College rock band, 'Flowers in Antarctica,' treated the students to a fantastic lunchtime performance.

Our ultimate goal for the Tree Planting event is to establish three forest layers in the riparian zone, creating habitats for local fauna. In the years to come we hope it develops a connected canopy of trees, including River Red Gums, Yellow Box, Candlebark, Silver Wattle, and Blackwood Wattle, allowing yellow-bellied sugar gliders and possums to move between them. The mid-storey will consist of shrubs including the Common Cassinia and River Bottle Brush to support birdlife, whilst the understory will feature smaller plants including the Spiny Headed Mat Rush and Common Tussock to provide homes for reptiles. A highlight of Friday's event was planting unique, deep-rooted sedges in the base of UT Creek to slow water flow, reduce erosion, and provide habitat for the critically endangered Spotted Tree Frogs. In the coming

weeks, students will be invited to continue planting in the creek bed. In a few months, a further 250 native plants will be ready for us to plant. Students will be planting these during lunchtimes, so stay tuned.

Research indicates that spending time in nature benefits us in many ways, including physically, intellectually, emotionally, mentally and ethically. Allowing students to have green time can enhance their learning and concentration. It's a win for our students and a win for nature!





















Mystery unearthed in Riparian zone

Respecting the instructions from our local police due to their ongoing investigation, we held off sharing our exciting news. We now have permission from the police to share our incredible story. Last Sunday, July 21st at 3:10 pm, Ms Steuart discovered the severed head of Princess Alexandra's statue in our rehabilitation zone!

The decapitated head was discovered face-down in a two-metre high blackberry thicket, beneath a pile of logs behind the College's Briggs Oval. Students will be surprised to learn that the head was only metres from our long-jump pit - just over the fence! Ms. Steuart had

been brush-cutting the

area in preparation for the College's Tree Planting Day.

Initially, she thought the partially buried object was yet another drum of dumped engine oil. However, she was surprised to find that it was hard and made of marble. Upon turning it over



and dragging it into the open, she realised it was the long-lost head of the town's vandalised royal statue. She sent the photo shown here to the Shire of Murrindindi with a promise to "drop it off on Monday morning" – clearly unaware of the significance of the find.

Trailer-loads of dumped items have been removed from the UT Creek riparian zone behind Briggs Oval. Each time we work in this rehabilitation zone, removing invasive plant species, cutting the weedy grass and chipping out the blackberries, more rubbish is revealed.

It's clearly a dumping hot spot, which is disappointing because it should be a place rich in biodiversity and a healthy, safe habitat for our wildlife and students.

Sunday's haul from the final thicket of blackberries included three car seats, multiple golf balls, a bucket-load of plastic bags and the missing head from Princess Alexandra's statue. Tracy Parker our beloved Café Manager was walking by at the end of the day as Ms Steuart and her husband were negotiating how to squeeze the head and three brush cutters into the car boot. Her reaction was a hint of the importance of the

discovery! She made Ms Steuart pose for a photograph holding the head.

The 6.5 kg head was collected by police constables on Monday morning after they took photos of it wrapped in a towel, sitting under Ms Steuart's school desk! A visit to the discovery site was made to search for evidence and to locate the missing piece of her marble hair bun.


The mystery of who decapitated Princess Alexandra's statue remains unsolved and is still being investigated. The porous nature of the white Carrara marble from which she was carved in 1876 is perfect for preserving fingerprints; however, her value is so high ("priceless", "A National Treasure" and "of great historical importance" is how she's been described to Ms Steuart by authorities) that Conservators advised against staining the surface with the fingerprinting process. Her bun will be repaired by an expert Sculpter in the near future, as will her damaged finger. These will then be reattached by a Conservator.

It was remarkable to discover an artefact of immense value in our rehabilitation zone. Although the irony of finding a symbol of early colonialism in a landscape that was degraded by colonial actions did not escape us.





Interested in a little bit of history about the Princess Alexandra Statue?



Considered to be "The most important royal portraits in Colonial Australia", four marble statues depicting Queen Victoria, her husband Albert and son, Edward VII and his wife Alexandra, were donated to the National Gallery of Victoria by a very rich man named William Clarke. He had commissioned the four royal statues to be carved by famous artist, Charles Summers.

The statues were displayed in their own gallery room at the National Gallery of Victoria and then put into storage.

In 1941, they were separated and Princess Alexandra was donated to our town. The National Gallery of Victoria have expressed their despair that the marble statues, which were designed to be displayed indoors, all were placed outside, leading to vandalism.
